2018 Second Regular Meeting

June 9, 2018

The second KOWIN DC regular meeting of 2018 was held at Washington Newstar Realty in conjunction with a KOWIN DC Bazaar on Saturday, June 9 with 14 members in attendance.

President Sami Lauri welcomed everyone and thanked everyone for their participation as she opened the meeting. It was an enlightening time learning about the current issues and what we can do actively as women when we become a victim of sexual misconduct.

2018 Third Regular Meeting

The third KOWIN DC regular meeting of 2018 was held at Woo Lae Oak in Virginia on Friday, August 3, 2018 with 14 members in attendance.

The meeting began with Vice President Cathy Kim's opening announcements and welcome. President Sami Lauri then introduced a new member, Ji Yeon Yeo.

The Vice President gave a recap of important items that were decided on last meeting such as the waiving of the initial membership fee and the venue for regular meetings, as well as ways to address communication issues. Next, a financial update was given from the Treasurer's committee.

The 18th Annual KOWIN Conference

August 28-30, 2018

The 18th KOWIN Convention, which was co-sponsored by the Ministry of Gender Equality and Family (MOGEF) and KOWINNER, took place from August 28-30. It was held in Sokcho, Gangwon Province with the theme of "The Korean Peninsula and the Road to World Peace." More than 550 Korean female leaders from 34 countries around the world participated. KOWIN DC members, Cathy Kim, Jieun Kang, Suzanne Kim Doud Galli, Lucy Nam, Sue-Kyung Vittas, Anne Choe, and JH Lee attended.

The conference officially started with a welcoming and inspiring speech from the Minister of MOGEF Chung Hyunback and a special cultural performance of the region called *dondolnal-i*, one of Korea's cultural heritages.

The Global Women Leader Forum, which was a core program of KOWIN, was divided into three sessions (Females and Peace; Preventing Gender Violence; and Increasing Female Social Participation), which led to

passionate discussions on the policies that were needed for peace to be actualized through equality.

On the second day, there was a networking session, which was divided into two groups: Economy and Society, and Education and Culture. In the afternoon, there was time set aside for participants to explore the local culture. We were able to have a pleasant time enjoying each other's company as we visited national parks as well as the local marketplace. As a special session for the overseas participants, we were able to visit the Unification Observatory and the DMZ museum.

As I participated for the first time, I was very impressed by the well-organized conference and the opportunity to meet Korean female leaders from all over the world. I hope to see more younger generation female leaders join next year.

So Lim, the first Korean American woman to be elected as city council member for the City of Fairfax, gave great life advice: First, find something that really resonates with what you want and resonates with you emotionally and second, break down your goal into specific steps to accomplish. Jessica Lee, who is the Senior Director at Council of Korean Americans, shared her experience of having lived and worked in DC for 10 years. She also shared how there is a great need for more people with Korean American sensibilities in the political arena to represent our voice properly.

In the second half of the program, the Social Etiquette Session was led by Louren Chen, Executive Officer of the Chief Information Office of the Defense Intelligence Agency, with assistance by Courtney Collins, who is the program coordinator for the International Training and Education program at American University as well as a Ph.D. candidate in the field of international higher education.

Contrary to what one may think of an etiquette lesson, it was an interesting as well as very practical time of redefining etiquette as she connected it with her own experiences of hosting and attending events in the U.S. as well as China, sometimes where there were 8000 guests in cultural events like the fourth of July. There were many questions from the audience and everyone enjoyed the great learning experience.

After the seminar, 35 attendees were specially invited to join the KOWIN DC holiday gala that evening. It was a great opportunity to share what KOWIN does with the younger Korean American woman community at large and the night was filled with fun activities, good food and good company. There were several awardees presented for their hard work and contribution to KOWIN. AALEAD 20th Anniversary Gala

On October 27, 2018, AALEAD (Asian American Leadership, Empowerment and Development), an NGO for which Dr. Yang-Ro Yoon is serving as a board member, celebrated its 20th anniversary of supporting low-income and underserved Asian Pacific American youth with a Gala evening at the Ronald Reagan Building and International Trade Center. Over 360 business and nonprofit leaders, public officials, educators, and AALEAD supporters and friends attended and the ambitious funding goal of about \$300,000 was achieved. Ten KOWIN DC members were able to attend and many more made significant contributions in various ways.







In her remarks as a Presenting Sponsor, Dr. Yoon shared that while AALEAD mainly serves Asian American youth, AALEAD is not for the Asian American community alone but for all Americans. She also emphasized that AALEAD is not just about diversity but also about unity: "AALEAD supports low income underserved Asian American youths to be empowered, self-confident, and feel comfortable with their own identity, and they will then be open-minded, tolerant, and generous to others. This way, our AALEAD kids will be good citizens of America and full members of this great country, 'out of many one,' 'E pluribus Unum." This message of a larger unity was particularly important as the Gala was taking place just a couple of hours after the tragic gun-shooting at a synagogue in Pittsburgh. Throughout this memorable evening, there was a palpable mood of energy, pride, and longing for a larger cause.

Young-Key Kim-Renaud

The 26th Hahn Moo-Sook Colloquium

Young-Key Kim-Renaud, Professor Emeritus of the East Asian Languages and Literatures Department at the George Washington University, devoted much time during this very busy season giving lectures and presentations at a number of conferences and at several universities. Among these were venues commemorating her mother, Hahn Moo-Sook's 100th birthday, both in the U.S. (the 26th Hahn Moo-Sook Colloquium held at George Washington University, November 9-10), and in Korea (Sookmyung Women's University, October 25). She also presented several research papers this year; among these were, "The Role of *Panmal* in the Evolving Korean Honorific System" (Indiana University, September 28); and "Korean Language, Power, and National Identity" (Monash University, Australia, August 17-18).

Young-Key also made numerous media appearances commenting about the recent developments in relations with North Korea following the third inter-Korean Summit, including CGTN America's "The Heat" with Anand Naidoo (March 9), "World Insight" with Tian Wei (May 3), and CGTN's "World Today" with Asieh Namdar (September 20).

Additionally, Young-Key also was given the distinction to have one of her poems be included in the American Rhetoric Online Speech Bank (April 4). "I Remember,"

which she recited in commemoration of the 60th anniversary of the signing of the Korean War Armistice, was included alongside those of dignitaries Barack Obama and Gen. Jeong Seung-jo, who gave addresses at the same event held at the Korean War Memorial on the National Mall (Washington, DC, July 27, 2013).

Suzanne Kim Doud Galli, MD, Ph.D., FACS, is a double board certified facial plastic and reconstructive surgeon in solo practice in Washington, D.C. She has been an active member of KOWIN DC since 2012 and traveled this year to Sokcho for the yearly conference. She spoke at Smith College's Women of Color Conference this year and was an invited speaker at several surgical conferences. She was appointed to the Board of Directors for the Council of Korean Americans.
